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


2019 National Conference

The 2019 GMTA State Conference will feature:

- Wendy Warner, cello, and Henry Kramer, piano, performance headliners (pictured on page 1).
- Terry Lowry, commissioned composer.

Conference Highlights:

Our pedagogy headliners will be Katherine Fisher and Dr. Julie Knerr Hague, authors of Piano Safari.

Dr. Julie Knerr Hague teaches piano at her home studio in Windsor, Connecticut. She was formerly on the piano faculty at the Hartt Community Division in West Hartford, Connecticut. Before returning to her home state of Connecticut, Julie taught applied piano, piano pedagogy, and group piano as a faculty member at the University of Missouri, Oklahoma City University, and Ohio University.

Julie holds a PhD in Music Education with an Emphasis in Piano Pedagogy from the University of Oklahoma, where her dissertation on elementary level piano technique was nominated for the Best PhD Dissertation Award in 2006. Additional degrees include MM degrees in Piano Performance and Piano Pedagogy from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where Dr. Knerr studied piano and harpsichord; and a BM in Piano Performance from the University of Puget Sound. Her mentors in Piano Pedagogy include Jane Magrath, Barbara Fast, Christos Tsitsaros, and Reid Alexander.

As an accomplished collaborative pianist, Julie enjoys performing with both instrumentalists and singers. Her former piano teachers include Duane Hulbert, James Barbagallo, William Heiles, Timothy Ehlen, and Edward Gates. Julie is a frequent adjudicator at festivals and competitions throughout the United States. Her current research interests include elementary level piano technique, lesser known pre-college piano repertoire, and group piano pedagogy.

Katherine Fisher is on the faculty of the <u>Athens Community Music School at Ohio University</u> in Athens, Ohio. Her responsibilities include teaching private piano lessons as well as coordinating the Piano Safari Program (group lessons) for children who are beginners at the instrument.

Katherine Fisher and Dr. Julie Knerr developed the Piano Safari Method during their time in school together at the University of Oklahoma. While graduate students, they realized they had a mutual dream of writing a piano method that would incorporate the best elements of the various techniques they had been using in their teaching.

Katherine is a member of the <u>Fisher Piano Duo</u> with husband, Dr. Christopher Fisher. The duo has performed throughout the United States. They are co-authors of the revised and expanded edition of <u>Piano Duet Repertoire</u> (Indiana University Press, 2016). A native of Ohio, Katherine received her degrees from the University of Oklahoma (MM in Piano Performance and Pedagogy) and the Wheaton College Conservatory of Music (BM in Piano Performance). Her former teachers include Jeongwon Ham, Jane Magrath, Barbara Fast, Karin R. Edwards, and Nancy Bachus.

DR. OWEN LOVELL, VP OF PROGRAMS

Our performance headliners will be Wendy Warner, cello, and Henry Kramer, piano.

Wendy Warner soared to international attention in 1990, winning top prize at the International Rostropovich Cello Competition at age eighteen. Her career took off with concerts conducted by Mstislav Rostropovich and debuts in Frankfurt, Stuttgart, Köln, Düsseldorf, Berlin and New York at Carnegie Hall. A Chicagoan from a musical family, Warner studied with Rostropovich at the Curtis Institute of Music from which she graduated. She has collaborated with prominent conductors Vladimir Spivakov, Christoph Eschenbach, Andre Previn, Jesús López Cobos and Michael Tilson Thomas, among others. And has appeared with leading U.S. orchestras and internationally—from Paris and London to Serbia and Russia.

Warner, as a part of the Beethoven Project Trio, played the 2009 world premiere of a newly discovered Beethoven piano trio. She and pianist Irina Nuzova recently performed the complete Beethoven cello sonatas on tour, with a special appearance at the U.S. Supreme Court. Other collaborators have been Vadim Gluzman, Gideon Kremer, the Fine Arts Quartet and Chicago Chamber Musicians. Warner, who has given recitals in Milan and Tokyo, is a frequent guest on WFMT in Chicago.

Hailed by Strings magazine for her "youthful, surging playing, natural stage presence and almost frightening technique," Wendy Warner can be heard on recordings for Cedille, including Haydn & Myslivecek; Russian Music for Cello & Piano; Popper & Piatigorsky; Double Play; and Eclipse. She has recorded Hindemith's chamber works on Bridge Records; Barber's Cello Concerto for Naxos; and compositions by Dalit Warshaw on Albany Records. An Avery Fisher Career Grant recipient, Warner holds the Leah D. Hamer Distinguished Faculty Chair at the Schwob School of Music, Columbus State University. She plays a 1772 Joseph Gagliano cello.

Praised by *The Cleveland Classical Review* for his "astonishingly confident technique" and *The New York Times* for "thrilling [and] triumphant" performances, pianist **Henry Kramer** is developing a reputation as a musician of rare sensitivity who combines stylish programming with insightful and exuberant interpretations. In 2016, he garnered international recognition with a Second Prize win in the Queen Elisabeth Competition in Brussels. Most recently, he was awarded a 2019 Avery Fisher Career Grant by Lincoln Center – one of the most coveted honors bestowed on young American soloists.

Kramer began playing piano at the relatively late age of 11 in his hometown of Cape Elizabeth, Maine. One day, he found himself entranced by the sound of film melodies as a friend played them on the piano, inspiring him to teach himself on his family's old upright. His parents enrolled him in lessons shortly thereafter, and within weeks, he was playing Chopin and Mozart.

Henry emerged as a winner in the National Chopin Competition in 2010, the Montreal International Competition in 2011 and the China Shanghai International Piano Competition in 2012. In 2014 he was added to the roster of Astral Artists, an organization that annually selects a handful of rising stars among strings, piano, woodwinds and voice candidates. The following year, he earned a top prize in the Honens International Piano Competition.

Kramer has performed "stunning" solo recital debuts, most notably at Alice Tully Hall as the recipient of the Juilliard School's William Petschek Award, as well as at Amsterdam's Concertgebouw. At his Philadelphia debut, Peter Dobrin of *The Philadelphia Inquirer* remarked, "the 31-year-old pianist personalized interpretations to such a degree that works emerged anew. He is a big personality."

A versatile performer, Kramer has soloed in concertos with the Bilkent Symphony Orchestra, Shanghai Philharmonic Orchestra, Indianapolis Symphony and the Calgary Philharmonic Orchestra, among many others, collaborating with conductors such as Marin Alsop, Gerard Schwarz, Stéphane Denève, Jan Pascal Tortelier and Hans Graf. Upcoming performances in the 2019-20 season include a return engagement with the National Orchestra of Belgium performing Beethoven's Concerto No. 4, as well as debuts with the Columbus and Hartford Symphony Orchestras playing Rachmaninoff's Piano Concerto No. 3.

His love for the chamber music repertoire began early in his studies while a young teenager. A sought-after collaborator, he has appeared in recitals at the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center, the Mainly Mozart Festival, the Mostly Mozart Festival, and La Jolla Music Society's Summerfest. His recording with violinist Jiyoon Lee on the Champs Hill label received four stars from *BBC Music Magazine*. This year, *Gramophone UK* praised Kramer's performance on a recording collaboration (Cedille Records) with violist Matthew Lipman for "exemplary flexible partnership." Henry has also performed alongside Emmanuel Pahud, the Calidore and Pacifica Quartets, Miriam Fried, as well as members of the Berlin Philharmonic and Orchestra of St. Luke's.

Teaching ranks among his greatest joys. Since 2018, Kramer has held the L. Rexford Distinguished Chair in Piano at the Schwob School of Music at Columbus State University in Columbus, Georgia. Throughout his multifaceted career, he has also held positions at Smith College and the University of Missouri Kansas City Conservatory of Dance and Music.

Kramer graduated from the Juilliard School where he worked with Julian Martin and Robert McDonald. He received his Doctorate of Musical Arts from the Yale School of Music under the guidance of Boris Berman. His teachers trace a pedagogical lineage extending back to Beethoven, Chopin and Busoni. Kramer is a Steinway Artist.

- Accomplishments/contributions to MTNA

- Community involvement
- Former student and/or parent letter of support (upload document)
- Professional colleague letter of support (upload document)

Nominations will need to be submitted online by Monday, September 9, 2019. The winner will be acknowledged at the 2019 GMTA Conference Banquet.

GMTA AWARDS AND GRANTS

LEIGH ANNE BLEICHNER, GMTA AWARDS CHAIR

The Nolting Award in Composition was established in 1987 and initially funded by beloved GMTA member Betty Nolting. It is given at the GMTA Conference each year to first-place winners in the MTNA Student Composition Competitions for the state-level competitions in each age category.

The Broadhurst Award in Piano was established in 1992 members). by the Broadhurst family in commemoration of Joan Broadhurst. This award is presented annually at the GMTA Any GMTA Conference to the winner of the MTNA Junior Performance Competition.

The GMTA General Award Fund, established in 1993, includes honorary and memorial gifts and is awarded at the discretion of the GMTA Finance Advisory Committee. Awards from this fund are given to senior string, vocal, and brass/woodwind winners of GMTA Auditions. Donations not designated for a specific fund go into this fund.

GMTA GRANTS

The Georgia Music Teachers Association will award four \$400 GMTA Grants to active or collegiate members of GMTA. Awarded grants can go toward student music instruction or professional development (including fees for school institutions or conference registrations for collegiate members).

Any GMTA active or collegiate member is eligible to apply for a GMTA Grant. Grants are awarded each year at the November GMTA State Conference. GMTA members can be awarded a GMTA Grant only once in a five-year period. The application deadline for a GMTA Grant is the 2nd Monday in September at 11:59 PM.

A raffle to support each of these funds will be held at the state conference. Local associations are encouraged to participate by donating items for the raffle.

It's summer! Time to take a break, right? Wrong! Now is the perfect time to begin recruiting for your local organization. July 1st starts the new teaching year, so we need to begin reaching out to those new, or old, teachers now, so they can experience the full benefit of what each chapter has to offer.

Where do you start? Start by having members submit the names of teachers they know or have heard of that are not members of your chapter, with contact information where known. ATHENS

Membership in Athens Music Teachers Association (AMTA) increased to 46 members this year. Our most significant accomplishment was updating our website presence where teachers can locate all information, enter students in events, and pay their application fees. To increase the effectiveness of Master Class, we divided it into two entirely separate sessions, one for those performing Intermediate repertoire and another for those playing Advanced selections with no age restrictions on either. Repertoire was confined to that catalogued in Jane Magrath's "The Pianist's Guide to Standard Teaching and Performance Literature." In addition, we restructured our grading system for festivals into three tiers: "Gold," "Silver," and "Bronze," thus enhancing the meaning of each score. We also began awarding pins to participants in the AMTA Festival as we have medals for those in the Sonatina Festival.

Sonatina Festival continues to be our most popular event with 18 teachers entering 123 students, followed by AMTA Festival with nine teachers entering 67 students. Twenty-three students entered Local Auditions, with nineteen advancing to Regionals; at State, three were awarded OP, eight earned AE, and two received HM. We continued Fall and Honors Recital as well as our quarterly newsletter where we read the biography of three different members each time.



Four business meetings included one workshop by Dr. Pete Jutras, a panel discussion, and a concert by Priscilla and Keith Jefcoat. Our opening Meet and Greet was a brunch, and our end of the year was a luncheon.

NORTH DEKALB

North DeKalb Music Teachers Association had 37 members in the year of 2018-19. Our members met once a month at Cambridge Music Academy in Johns Creek from August-May for business meetings and programs except for December and April when luncheons were held.

We held three student events: Bach Competition (October) biennially and Ensemble Olympics (February) annually and Local Auditions (February). The Bach competition promotes the teaching and learning of contrapuntal techniques and repertoire. This year, the competition had 238 entries in 7 categories: Anna Magdalena Notebook, Little Preludes and Fugues, CPE Bach Selections, Two-Part Invention, Three-Part Invention/Duetto, French Suite, Partita, English Suite, Fantasia, Prelude and Fugue, Toccata/Italian Concerto/Chromatic Fantasy or Fugue. The competition took place at the music building of Georgia State University (GSU) in Atlanta. ND awarded 53 students a cash scholarship. All first-place and second-place winners performed at the winners' recitals the next day at PianoWorks in Duluth.

The Ensemble is a non-competitive event organized in 45-minute mini-concert format. It encourages students to collaborate with others. We had total of 207 entries-181 duets and 26 concertos. Eight teachers participated, and nine concerts were formed. This is our fund-raising event.

Local Auditions were held at GSU with 89 entries. 81 students received OP and advanced to regional round. ND offers two scholarships to high school students. Our scholarship winners are Annabel Shue, first place; Alice Zhang and Jessica Tang tied for second place.

As for our programs, ND invited Dr. Jeremy Samolesky (September) and Raffi Besalyan (March) to be the clinicians for master classes. The other programs focused on repertory: Piano Sonatas of Mozart (David Fung), Fitzwilliam Virginal Book (George Mann), Albums for the Young (Dr. Grace Huang), New Music for Piano-Repertoire of All Levels, Suggestions for Recitals and Competitions (Dr. Liza Stepanova), Beethoven's Early Works (Dr. Sergio Gallo). Each speaker shared great resources with our teachers. The topics covered from Renaissance to contemporary music.

Later in February, we held our Local Auditions as well as GATE and GMTA Theory tests. Local Auditions was a HUGE success with a massive increase in participation. We had a total of seventeen students move on to Regional Auditions, and we had more students in State Auditions than I can remember from years past.

In March, we held our Federated Festival. Participation was down, but I believe it is a turning point as we had several teachers express interest and volunteer their time despite not entering students this year.

Soon after on March 17, we had our largest Honors Recital in CFMTA history. We had twenty-seven performers, including a solo guitar performance and a duet on piano and cello.

While we had much larger numbers in State Auditions than in recent years, we did not fare as well as we might have liked. We are educating ourselves on how to improve in future GMTA State Auditions.

We look forward to installing new officers in key positions during our annual Spring Luncheon. Overall, it has been the best year for CFMTA in a very long time. We look forward to continued growth both in numbers and professionally in the year to come.

SAVANNAH



COLLEGIATE CHAPTER REPORT



While our teaching schedules may be winding down, this is also the time when we plan for the 2019-20 school year. It is my goal to introduce our students to the value of GMTA and MTNA during their college years. So as we head into the summer months, here are some ideas for ways to involve your college students during the 2019-20 school year:

- Encourage them to join GMTA and MTNA! It is only \$29 for college students to join both GMTA and MTNA. (Local association dues vary.)
- Encourage them to attend the GMTA Fall Conference. College students who are members of GMTA attend the annual conference for FREE!
- If you have students attending the fall conference, let me know (aneal@shorter.edu). I am hoping to
 have an opportunity for the college students to get together while we're in Columbus. ●
- As we interact with each other in GMTA, encourage your students to begin networking in our state. As our students graduate, they will be the next leaders of GMTA. How wonderful will it be if they already know each other from their college years!
- If you have a collegiate chapter in place, look for ways to support your community both within your host institution and beyond. Collegiate chapters have offered recitals, workshops, and service projects in a variety of ways. This can be as simple as performing at a nursing home or as involved as hosting a summer camp. Georgia currently boasts seven collegiate chapters, but I would love to see that number increase across our state. If you have even a few interested students (of any major or instrument), you can start a chapter! MUSICLINK MYTHS

As a MusicLink (ML) Coordinator, I often hear from teachers who would like to get involved in MusicLink but have come to accept certain myths about the program which prevent them from following through. I would like to dispel some of these myths. Here are a few of the more common ones:

MYTH: It's a complicated, time-consuming procedure to register a student in ML.

FACT: It takes the completion of one 1½ page registration form, and now this can even be done online. No downloading, copying or mailing is involved.

MYTH: Being a ML teacher will involve a lot of paperwork. I don't have time for that.

FACT: Once a student is registered, there is no other paperwork involved except for a 1-page evaluation which is completed each spring. You are asked to rate your student's progress in 4 areas. It should take less than 5 minutes to complete. This can also be done online.

MYTH: I will have to change the way I teach to meet someone else's method.

FACT: You teach your ML student exactly the same way you teach any of your other students.

MYTH: Once I agree to be a ML teacher, I will be expected to take several students on scholarship.

FACT: As a ML teacher, you are asked to take on just one student. Many teachers choose to teach more than one student, but the vast majority teaches one student.

MYTH: As a ML teacher, I will be expected to teach a student for no pay at all.

FACT: A ML teacher must agree to teach a student at up to one-half the teacher's normal rate. The exact amount will depend upon the situation of the student. Many families are able to pay a nominal amount, and this is encouraged by the ML Foundation as a way of fostering commitment to lessons.

MYTH: Once I take on a ML student, I must continue to teach them even if they don't practice or show up for lessons regularly.

FACT: If a ML student doesn't show commitment to lessons, they will be dropped from the program. You are under no obligation to teach an uncommitted student.

MYTH: I could end up teaching a student who isn't in need at all.

FACT: Any family that registers their student online is asked to send in the first page of their most current Tax Return to document their financial need.

MYTH: If I teach a MusicLink student, everyone will find out and I will be asked to lower my fee for my other students.

FACT: The only way anyone will know that your student is a MusicLink student is if you share this information with others. We do not share that information with anyone.


