She and Mandy Reynolds worked tirelessly to provide GMTA members with the opportunity for their students to continue the Audition process through video recordings of the Region and State Auditions. GMTA led the way for other states, and even MTNA. As a result of our virtual auditions and all of the Local Associations making an effort to continue with events and meetings, Georgia was chosen to be MTNA's 2021 State Affiliate of the Year. I think this is a first for GMTA! What a great honor in such a difficult year, and each member is to be commended for this award.

In another first for GMTA, our 2020 Commissioned Composer, Dr. Peter van Zandt Lane, was selected as MTNA's Distinguished Composer of the Year. Congratulations to Dr. Lane! His presentation at the MTNA Conference was outstanding.

I had the privilege of attending the 2021 MTNA Virtual Conference. One of the nice things about the virtual format is that we can continue watching sessions until December, allowing us to enjoy many more sessions than if we had attended in person. Still, I am looking forward to attending the 2022 MTNA Conference in Minneapolis, MN on March 26-30, 2022.

Our state conference is scheduled for November 4-6, 2021 at Piedmont University in Demorest, Georgia. Kristi Heflen and Jeri-Mae Astolfi have been working to make the 2021 conference a memorable one in the North Georgia mountains. You can see more information about the conference throughout this newsletter. We are excited to be together in 2021.

Finally, I am proud of our state for the increased participation in our virtual MTNA Auditions. We held our 2020 MTNA Competitions in October with 108 entrants, which was up from 76 entrants in 2019. 2021 GMTA STATE CONFERENCE

Make plans now to join us for the Georgia Music Teachers Association State Conference, November 4-6, 2021. This fall we will be surrounded by the beautiful North Georgia Mountains at Piedmont University in Demorest, Georgia. We are excited to announce our Pedagogy Headliner, Conference Recitalist, and Commissioned Composer.



We are delighted to announce that our *Pedagogy Headliner* for this fall is *Martha Hilley*, Immediate Past President of MTNA. Ms. Hilley joined the faculty of the University of Texas in 1982 where she was coordinator of group piano and a member of the piano pedagogy faculty. She served two years as head of the keyboard division, five years as Associate Director of the School of Music, and two different five-year terms as Director of Undergraduate Studies. She has been an active participant in workshops, conferences, and seminars on the international, national, state, and local levels, including International Pedagogy Workshops in Italy, Belgium, Norway, Australia, Austria, and Hawaii, working alongside Lynn Freeman Olson. Among her many honors are the MTNA Teacher of the Year (2014) and a Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy (2017).

We welcome *Dr. Jasmin Arakawa*, University of Florida, as our *Conference Recitalist*. Dr. Arakawa has performed widely in North America, Central and South America, Europe, China, and Japan. She has been heard at Carnegie Hall, Salle Gaveau in Paris, and Victoria Hall in Geneva, as well as in broadcasts of the BBC and Radio France. Other performance highlights include guest artist appearances at the Toronto Summer Festival, Ribadeo International Music Festival in Spain, Bicentenaire de Chopin in Switzerland, Scotiabank Northern Lights Music Festival in Mexico, Festival de Musica de Camara in Peru, and Dame Myra Hess Concert Series in Chicago.





Garrison Gerard, from the University of North Texas, is our 2021 GMTA Commissioned Composer. A composer of electroacoustic and concert music and an ardent collaborator, Gerard has been commissioned by ensembles and soloists, including Andrew Cook, Spencer Byrd, the Avenue C Project, Atelier Piano Quartet, and Amorsima String Trio. His music has been presented internationally in performances by [Mod]ular Ensemble, Fort Worth Symphony, and Nu Atmosphere Ensemble. Growing up in North Georgia, the influence of the natural beauty of the area has had a lasting impact on his work. His current interest is in intermedia collaboration and the interaction between nature and music. Recently he has worked with choreographer Brianna Lee, exploring the nature of communication and joint improvisation. Gerard holds a masters degree in music

composition from the University of North Texas, a bachelors in piano from Harding University in Arkansas, and is currently a PhD candidate at UNT where he serves as composition teaching fellow.





JERI-MAE ASTOLFI, NCTM, GMTA COMMISSIONING CHAIR





ARTS AWARENESS & ADVOCACY

DEBRA HUGHES. NCMT, GMTA ARTS AWARENESS & ADVOCACY CHAIR

ARTS AWARENESS: I recommend the book "ARTS AWARENESS" by Patricia Hoy (performer/conductor/arts administrator). Hoy shares real life stories that uncover the power that can come from making music and art. "Arts Awareness" offers a fresh perspective and new ways for everyone to reach out and interact with the world. Music advocacy organizations, teachers, and parents will discover new ways to promote the value of the arts.

ADVOCACY: Advocacy involves educating and informing elected officials, the public, and the media about the importance of the performing arts. Here are some suggestions from MTNA:

- Performance in a public venue, especially in unexpected or informal venues: street performances in a downtown shopping area; outdoor park concert; performance at a prison, community center, hospital lobby, senior citizen residence, museum or art gallery, or faith-based venue.
- Festival or competition, such as a Bach festival for students of any instrument that features an afternoon of music games and activities organized by university students.
- A fundraising or charity-based event, such as a studio team for Relay for Life or donation of music lessons to a silent auction.
- Participation in city-based events, such as a studio entry in a local parade or a booth at a city festival that promotes the benefits of arts education.
- Projects with community partners or association in the local Chamber of Commerce or civic group events.

If every GMTA teacher EACH would commit to just one public and positive performance/project a year, it would strengthen GMTA's Arts Advocacy in Georgia. Let's all think of one way we can invite or be involved musically with the general public!

I had mini-recitals - 30 minutes long - and invited my entire neighborhood. I drew circles on the driveway for social distancing and outfitted my garage as a concert venue. Every 45 minutes I had a handful of students perform repertoire in the open air forum. It was a huge success, and everyone said how important that day of music was to them. It was positive and public. It was Arts Advocacy in Action.

GEORGIA'S OWN: We currently have 18 GMTA teachers who are willing to present 58 different topics. GMTA encourages all of their MTA chapters to utilize these experts at local meetings. Go to GeorgiaMTA.org under resources to find contact information.



WELLNESS REPORT

DEBRA RAMSEY DICKENSHEETS. GMTA WELLNESS CHAIR

COVID-19 illness hit Georgia in March 2020 and remains a serious health problem now in the spring and summer of 2021. Fortunately, the high peaks of illness seen previously, especially in January 2021, are not present now. Cases have decreased to levels summer 2020 although there remain hotspots in other parts of the country. However, case numbers remain elevated in younger people (our students!) so we need to remain vigilant.

We have learned that COVID-19 spreads between people who are in close contact, through respiratory droplets or small particles produced when an infected person coughs, talks or breathes. Indoor environments with poor ventilation increase the risk of transmission. So, prevention guidelines have focused on the following:

- Frequent hand-washing with soap and water or alcohol-based hand rub
- Masking of both nose and mouth
- Maintaining at least a 6-foot distance from a person coughing or sneezing
- Maximizing ventilation
- Allowing fresh air to enter the room, If possible
- Minimize close contact
- Clean high touch areas daily or more often as needed
- Monitor your health and be alert for symptoms

Studies have shown that utilizing these prevention measures decreases the spread of COVID-19. In addition, vaccine usage has decreased the spread of the virus. Transmission is greatly decreased in people who have received the vaccine. The CDC has relaxed some of the guidelines of prevention for vaccinated people as more information becomes available.

There are now three COVID-19 vaccines in the US that have received Emergency Use Authorization and are in usage. As more safety information becomes available, younger age groups will be able to receive the vaccine. We are hopeful that as more of the population is vaccinated and, over time, COVID-19 cases decrease to low levels, precautions can be relaxed further and we can return to normal teacher-student relations.

Gwinnett County Music Teachers Association had a year full of educational programs (via Zoom) for our teachers. Our 2020-2021 program lineup was as follows:

- September Dr. Grace Huang, University of Georgia: "Teaching the 21st Century Student"
- October David Watkins: "Beethoven's Transition from the Classical to the Romantic Period"
- November Dr. Martha Thomas and Dr. Pete Jutras: "How to Prepare Your Student for Debussy"
- January a round table discussion on hosting online recitals and performances
- February Portia Hawkins: "African-American Composers"
- March our annual master class with Dr. Jerico Vasquez

At our November Music Day, students competed for cash prizes totaling \$1140; as of this writing, our NFMC Federated Festivals are ongoing, with students choosing in-person or virtual auditions in piano, voice and guitar. Thirty-nine entrants representing 13 teachers performed in Local Auditions via video submission, with 37 students designated Outstanding Performer and progressing to Regional Auditions. Finally, our Junior/Senior Scholarship competition was held in April as a video audition, with a total of \$2100 in cash awards awarded to the top five performers. We will conclude our academic year with an in-person gathering at Alexander Park in Lawrenceville for our May luncheon and Teacher of the Year presentation.




CHARLES HUTTON, PRESIDENT

Decatur MTA has carried on with Zoom meetings during the COVID pandemic. Thankfully, our meetings have not seen a drop in attendance numbers, although some usual members have been unable to attend online. Some of our presenters and topics have been Annalisa Chang on teaching Special Needs children, Pam Martin and Kristi Helfen on the piano duets of Pam's mother Winnifred Hyson, GSU's Sergio Gallo on the music of Anton Rubinstein, and Pam Asberry on her journey to be a composer and solo artist. In lieu of our usual May musicale, we ended the year with members sharing their performances on YouTube.

Our spring auditions had slightly more entrants at the local level than usual.

DMTA's Jo Evans Scholarship for High School pianists had disappointing participation, with only one applicant this year. After trying the event in October of last school year, the event is now set to occur every year in April or May. Applicants are required to perform from memory the slow movement (Andante or slower) of a Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven, or Schubert sonata and one other piece of any style period. High-school-age students of any GMTA teacher are welcome to apply next year.





GMTA AWARD FUNDS

MARY ANN MCTIER, GMTA AWARDS CHAIR

The Nolting Award in Composition was established in 1987 and initially funded by beloved GMTA member Betty Nolting. It is given at the GMTA Conference each year to first-place winners in the MTNA Student Composition Competitions for the state-level competitions in each age category.

The Broadhurst Award in Piano was established in 1992 by the Broadhurst family in commemoration of Joan Broadhurst. This award is presented annually at the GMTA conference to the winner of the MTNA Junior Performance Competition.

The GMTA General Award Fund, established in 1993, includes honorary and memorial gifts and is awarded at the discretion of the GMTA Finance Advisory Committee. Awards from this fund are given to senior string, vocal, and brass/woodwind winners of GMTA auditions. Donations not designated for a specific fund go into this fund.

The Betty H. White Award Fund was established in 2019 by the White family in commemoration of Betty H. White. This award will be given annually at the discretion of the FAC.

- Participation in local, state, and/or national MTNA programs
- Community involvement
- Former student and/or parent letter(s) of support
- Professional colleague letter(s) of support
- Nominating letter from the state organization
